2. Customize Infant Feeding Sanitation Kit



Each area and every emergency are different. This month, put some time into considering how you might want to customize a version of the infant feeding sanitation kit, if it were needed. Using the most common emergency in your area, consider if sanitation kits would be needed and what should go in them.

While you are searching, look for the emergency services and disaster planning organizations and contacts that serve your area.

5. Field / Community Experience - RNA with 3 caregivers

The best way to get comfortable working with families and sites is to do it, then practice periodically to develop and maintain that skill. You don't need to wait for an emergency situation to occur - there are families everywhere who do not have reliable access to safe water and other resources needed to safely feed children under 3 years old, and organizations that try to meet their needs.

In the next month, aim to use the Rapid Needs Assessment with at least 3 caregivers. If you are unable to connect with people who may be in need, ask someone to help you practice by role playing a scenario.



	<p>Alimentación Segura Infantil (ASI)</p> <p>This organization, run by Lourdes Santaballa and other dedicated persons, works to support food safety and security for infants, in and outside of emergencies. They have many useful resources, particularly in Spanish. https://www.asi-iycf.org/</p>

<p>English:</p>  <p>DIY SAFE Infant Feeding Sanitation Kit</p> <p>When water is not safe to drink or to reduce germs on feeding items more than usual, you can use these components to make water safe to drink and sanitize use and other protection.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> A small plastic bin – 8 qt (kilometer size works well) Water filter – regular, cloth-filter-free, or fabric protected; Regular Cloth & fabric protected NO fragrance, no fabric-sprays, or fabric protected; Regular Cloth & fabric protected Baby bottle brush with soapie cleaner Clorox bleach – 1/2 oz per 5 liters of water in a plastic bag – to clean baby if can't clean bottles Syringe – 5 mL or 10 mL – for measuring bleach Drop cloth – 4 x 12 inches <p>Steps to Sanitize & Safe infant Feeding Supplies in Emergency Situations:</p> <p>Make water safe to drink → Clean & disinfect → Sanitize → Air Dry</p> <p>Filter if necessary → Use water that's safe to drink → Do NOT reuse.</p> <p>Boil or disinfect.
